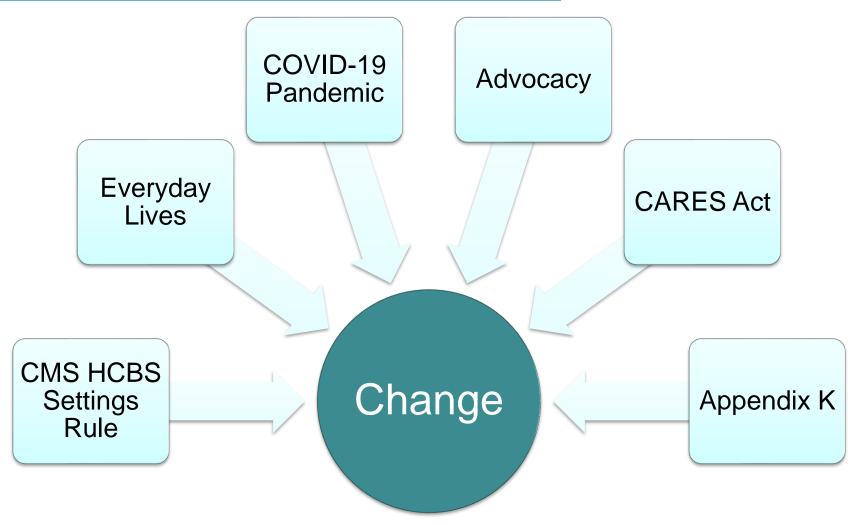

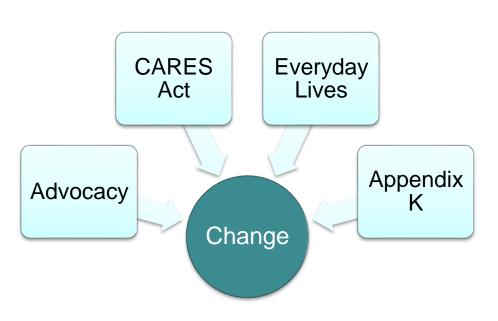

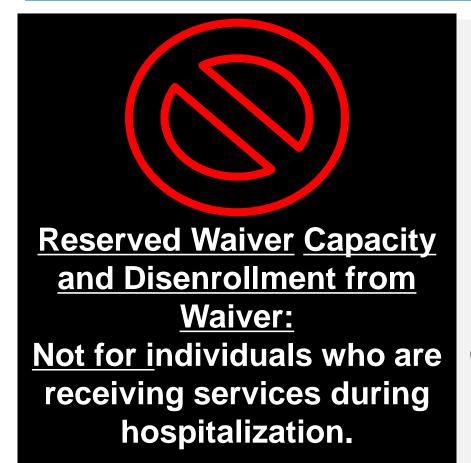
Services in Medical Hospital



- Services in a hospital can only be rendered for assisting the individual with the following:
 - Communication;
 - Intensive Personal Care; and/or
 - Behavior Support/stabilization as enumerated in the behavior support plan
- The service must be:
 - Identified in the ISP;
 - Provided to meet the needs of the individual that are not met through the provision of hospital services;
 - Designed to ensure smooth transitions between hospital and community
 - Not a substitute for services that hospital is obligated to provide

Reserved Waiver Capacity during Hospitalization





Reserved Waiver Capacity and Disenrollment from Waiver:

For individuals who are NOT receiving waiver services during hospitalization or in other settings where waiver services cannot be delivered (such as psychiatric hospital settings, rehabilitation care programs, and nursing homes)

Direct Services Via Remote Technology



Definition of Direct Service

- The provision of a service where the staff and individual(s) engage in activities outlined in the service definition that meet the goals/outcomes of the participant and ensures the health and safety of the participant.
- To bill remote services, the staff must be actively engaging with the participant(s) using remote technology in accordance with the ODP policy.
- To bill in-person direct services, the staff must be in the same service location as the participant(s).

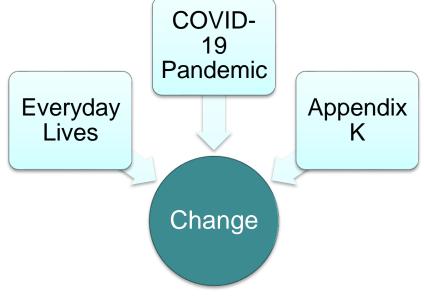

- Community Participation Support
 - 10 Hours / (40) 15-minute units per week
- In-Home and Community Support
 - Not allowed overnight
- Companion
 - Not allowed overnight
- Behavioral Support

- Therapy Services
- Supports Broker
- Consultative Nutritional Services

Assistive Technology



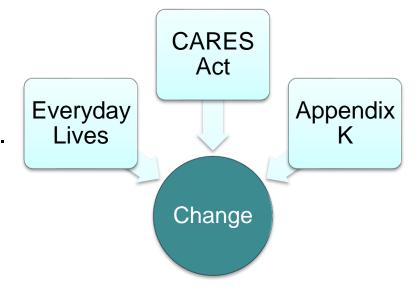
Remote Monitoring will now be referred to as Remote Support.

- Definition of Remote Support
 - An individual has technology that uses two-way real time communication in their home or community that allows someone from an agency who is offsite to monitor and respond to the individual's safety needs.
 - Examples of technology includes home-based sensors, cameras, and other technologies.
 - When "hands on" approaches are not required, Remote Support makes it possible for an individual's health, wellness and safety needs to be met, supporting the individual's need for greater independence. Direct interaction with a professional occurs as needed but is not the main function of the service.

Assistive Technology



- Allowing for the coverage of internet service to individuals who reside in a private home, only when needed for remote support equipment to function.
- Increasing the cost of devices that require an independent evaluation from \$500 to \$750.
- Expanding the limits for intensive remote support above \$5,000 using the variance process.
- Adding qualification criteria for the provider to be able to intensive remote supports provided above \$5,000.

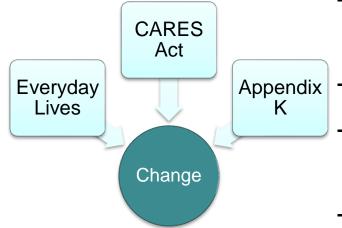

Residential Services

- Adding assistive technology professional to provider qualifications for Residential Habilitation and Supported Living effective January 1, 2022.
 - Complete evaluations of assistive technology needs.
 - Complete an evaluation plan.
 - Inform the individual of impact on privacy.
 - Ensure technology in good working order



Residential Services



- Clarifying provider qualification requirements for executive level staff in Residential Habilitation, Life Sharing and Supported Living
 - Responsibility for all of the following:
 - ✓ Day-to-day residential agency operations;
 - ✓ Oversight of the development and implementation of residential agency-wide policies and procedures;
 - ✓ Supervision of management-level staff; and
 - ✓ Compliance with applicable state and federal regulations.

Service changes



Housing Transition:

"Assisting with the housing search process of searching for a home that is located in an integrated setting that is dispersed in the community in a noncontiguous location not located on a campus setting. Housing Transition cannot be used to find homes that are developed for or promoted as serving people with an intellectual disability and/or Autism that isolate or segregate the participant from the community of individuals who do not have an intellectual disability and/or Autism."

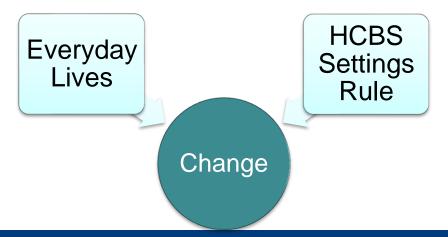

Benefits Counseling

- Expand provider qualifications to give providers the ability to render this service with either a Certified Work Incentives Counselor certification OR Work Incentive Practitioner
- ODP Communication <u>20-012</u>



General changes



Restrictive Interventions:

Remove language regarding staffing ratios
 "Intensive supervision such as 1:1 or 2:1 staffing levels or higher
 for purposes of behavior monitoring/intervention/ redirection."

Rate determination methods:

Any changes will be communicated before they become effective.

"The VF/EA and AWC wage ranges are issued by ODP prior to **any changes in wage ranges** July 1 each year in a standard ODP communication. In addition, **changes to** the AWC MA fee schedule rates are communicated prior to July 1 each year **implementation** through a public notice published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. Wage ranges & fee schedule rates, when applicable, are implemented prospectively.

Provider Qualifications



"If a criminal history clearance and/or the criminal history record check identifies a criminal record, providers must make a case-by-case decision about whether to hire the person that includes consideration of the following factors:

- The nature of the crime;
- Facts surrounding the conviction;
- Time elapsed since the conviction;
- The evidence of the individual's rehabilitation;
- The nature and requirements of the job; and
- The performance of individualized risk assessments."
