




The following eight webcasts build on the information presented in the Office of Developmental Programs (ODP) Introduction and Overview Webinars that are a prerequisite to completing this series.




In the Introduction and Overview webinars, you learned some of the drivers for changes in the Incident Management system. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Inspector General found that states' policies and procedures did not establish clear definitions and examples of potential abuse and neglect.

The *Chapter 6100 Regulations* and Licensing Regulations outline safeguards for health, safety, and rights. A link to the *Chapter 6100 Regulations* is provided as a resource to this training series. In addition, many laws mandate reporting of abuse, neglect, and exploitation for individuals with an Intellectual Disability or Autism.




The webinars provided an overview of the requirements and changes in the *Incident Management Bulletin*. This webcast series is about our responsibility to recognize incidents that have occurred, are alleged or suspected, respond to the individual's immediate needs, and elevate the information to others in the incident management process.



As you learn about Incident Management, stay focused on what matters most. Something bad has happened or may have happened in a person's life. The incidents we'll discuss are hard to think about; we'd avoid them if we could. But it is our responsibility to recognize these events so that we can better help the people we support to be healthy and safe.

Incidents run the range from the risk of missing a medication to life-changing injuries, illnesses, abuse, neglect, and even death. An individual with an Intellectual Disability or Autism did not receive the care and support he or she needs to be healthy and safe, was taken advantage of, or hurt.

By heightening our awareness and being diligent with our recognition skills, we can all work together to ensure swift action to address issues and prevent recurrence to protect individuals' health and safety.



The content of the Incident Management training series is offered by the Office of Developmental Programs to meet the General Orientation and Annual Training requirements specific to recognizing and reporting incidents. The requirements are identified in the 55 PA Code Chapters 6100 (All Services), 6400 (Community Homes), 6500 (Life Sharing), 2380 (Adult Training Facility) and 2390 (Vocational Training) Regulations for individuals with an Intellectual Disability and Autism. The content of the training series is a companion, not a substitute, for reading the Incident Management Bulletin to ensure your full understanding and ability to implement the required practices. In general, organizational leadership will need to read the entire Bulletin and then develop and implement the written agency policies and procedures to ensure their staff are able to carry out their roles and responsibilities.


